### SHARED LANGUAGE

- Animism is the belief that objects, places, and creatures all possess a distinct spiritual essence. Potentially, animism perceives all things—animals, plants, rocks, rivers, weather systems, human handiwork, and perhaps even words—as animated and alive. It is the recognition that living humans are just one kind of person in a much wider field of relationships.
- **Biopsychosocial framework** is an approach to describing and explaining how biological, psychological and social factors combine and interact to influence physical and mental health.
- Capitalism is an economic system based on the private ownership of the means of production and their
  operation for profit. Characteristics central to capitalism include private property, capital accumulation, wage
  labor, voluntary exchange, an economic system characterized by private or corporate ownership of capital goods,
  by investments that are determined by private decision, and by prices, production, and the distribution of goods
  that are determined mainly by competition in a free market.
- Colonialism describes the presence of colonial administrative structures within countries that are under a dominant rule by an external colonizing political force.
- Coloniality denotes "colonial forms of domination after the end of colonial administrations, produced by colonial cultures and structures in the modern/colonial world-system".
- **Cultural Trauma** is a dysregulation of the collective's nervous system, often due to systemic oppression and in response to horrific events that radically shift the group consciousness and identities.
- **Decoloniality** is an epistemic and political project that relates to social, economic and analytic approaches which reject the pillars of Western imperialism—invention of race, control of labor, New World capitalism, modernity.
- Modernity refers to a powerful set of cultural, political, economic, and spatial relationships that have fundamentally influenced the nature of social life, the economy, and the use and experience of time and space.
- Mythic Mind is a cultural and intellectual practice that defines, describes and gives meaning to all aspects of life —natural, civil, sacred and social.
- **Race** is a specious classification of human beings created by Europeans which assigns human worth and social status using "white" as the model of humanity and the height of human achievement for the purpose of establishing and maintaining privilege and power.
- Racialization as an expression of a shared value of a group, racialization is the institutionalized devaluing, and simultaneous extraction of value, from one particular group by another.
- Racism is racial prejudice + social and institutional power; an advantage based on race; oppression based on race. Racism is a cultural trauma.
- Social Imaginary the set of values, institutions, laws, and symbols common to a particular social group and the corresponding society through which people imagine their social whole.
- Sociogeny, or sociogenesis, describes the development of a social phenomenon.
- **Somatics** is any set of perspectives or practices that work with the lived, subjective experience of the body. Body experience is understood holistically, within cultural, social, ecological, and philosophical contexts. Somatics as a field emerged in the 1970's in western culture, however, the lived experience of the body has been long recognized and articulated in indigenous cultures globally.
- White Supremacy is the idea that white [Euro-descended] ideas, thoughts, beliefs, values, morality, and concepts of humanity are superior to everyone else's. It does not refer to people. It refers to ideas.
